Craig Dershowitz: 12 or 13 years, and Artists for Israel had a couple of different missions, and about 50% of our time was dedicated to Israeli advocacy, or Hasbara.

Craig Dershowitz: promoting the idea of Israel, and using our art forms to inspire pro-Israel sentiment in the young, youthful arts communities, and to then, once we capture their attention, to use their fan base to also become fans of the country.

You know, and I have to wear a net with a tie up so that you couldn't see anything, and I had the beard, that helped.

Craig Dershowitz: And of course, they brought up Torah to me, and of course, they brought up, you know, the Shoah, and, you know, I started bringing up rabbis, and I would explain to rabbis what we were doing, and we started having debates and conversations, and it was really meaningful, and I understood that.

Craig Dershowitz: to stop you from bothering it, right? You're a good CEO, you run the org really well, like, we've grown from, like, a \$20 budget to a half a million to a million dollar budget, we're helping people.

Craig Dershowitz: Our study highlights tattooing not only as a personal expression, but as a psychosocial intervention, a therapeutic embodied practice that facilitates emotional processing, resilience, and a symbolic healing. Healing Inc. Israel stands as a powerful and innovative model for trauma-informed community recovery.

Craig Dershowitz: In which the body becomes a living canvas for memory, identity, and renewal.

Craig Dershowitz: Although our research is still underway, our preliminary findings clearly indicate that Healing Inc. has a profound impact on survivors' emotional well-being, sense of agency, and belonging. Participants consistently describe the experience as lifechanging, offering comfort, dignity, and a renewed sense of strength.

The guy on the other end is like.

And to us, it might seem silly, but to Avi, that was part of his life, that he felt he couldn't live.
